# My Russian Memoirs

In this book Sir Bernard Pares, Professor of Russian in the University of London, surveys the twentieth century historical and political development of Russia. The writer is in a unique position. He chose this subject for his life work and has been in close personal relations with the most prominent characters in the story independently of all party views and, having the confidence of the most various persons, was able at each event, of many of which he was an eye-witness, to have the frankest explanation of their actions, views and objects. The end of the book follows the fate of the principal actors since the revolution, deals with the Bolshevist propaganda in England and gives a sketch of the main trend of events in Russia up to date.
